## Day 1

### Welcome and Updates:

- Clarence Nelson Sr. provided a welcome on behalf of First Nations.
- Agenda review and introductions of all the participants.
- First Nations, Province and MPAC member updates.
- PNCIMA update provided, specifically in relation to MaPP.
- Review of MPAC Meeting #4 and Advice Log.

### Updates

- Commercial Fishing Caucus's decision to withdraw from the MaPP process was noted. MaPP will continue to pursue input from commercial fisheries interests.
- New MPAC members were identified:
  - Charles Justice – Public Recreation
  - Mike Viverios – Coastal Forestry alternate
  - Jamie Scarrow – Tourism (Michael Uehara becomes alternate)
  - Karl Bergman – Local Government (SQCRD)

### Issues, Objectives and Strategies:

- Draft objectives and strategies around a number of topics were presented.
- For each objective, participants were asked:
  - Do you feel that this set of strategies addresses the objective and supports the identified MaPP output? Is anything missing?
  - Do you have any advice or examples of actions to support implementation of the strategies (e.g., priority actions or areas, existing related and complementary projects or proposals)?
- A number of comments were received during group discussion. Key pieces are summarized below, and all comments will be used in refining plan components.

### Issues, Objectives and Strategies – Fisheries

#### Key Discussion Items

- Infrastructure to support commercial fishing and all other marine related activity.
- Education programs and level of competencies to participate in fishing and other marine related activities, ideally with a focus on skills training to support long term employment in various fields/projects.
- First Nations FSC requirements and harvesting in marine protected areas.
- Ecological impact of fisheries and tools able to deal with impacts. Monitoring and sharing of data are important aspects.

## Issues, Objectives and Strategies – Governance

### Key Discussion Items

- Consistency of provincial Land Act tenuring policy in relation to engagement with First Nations.
- Legislation not considered within the existing Reconciliation Agreement between Coastal First Nations and the province.
- Structures to implement marine use plans and the establishment a network of marine protected areas.
- Role and participation of local governments.

## Issues, Objectives and Strategies – Marine Economies and Communities

### Key Discussion Items

- Industry economic strategic planning in relationship to ecosystem based management principles and benchmarks.
- Needs and capacity for marine based workforce requirements.
- Contribution and impact of the “non-formal marine based economy”.
- First Nations participation in the marine based economy.

### Marine Spatial Planning Tools – Building Understanding

### Key Discussion Items

- History and background of the BCMCA.
- Introduction to the Marxan model.
- Relevance and usefulness to the MaPP marine spatial planning process.
- Need to be clear and transparent regarding limitations and assumptions within the model
- The use of the BCMCA Marxan analysis for the MaPP planning area as a representation of ecologically high value areas.
